#### Purpose and function of taxonomies

#### What is a taxonomy

 A classification system designed to identify economic activities aligned with green criteria and green-/climate-oriented performance goals



- Serves as a tool for investors, green bond issuers, and policymakers to:
  - Identify green activities and their underlying projects/assets
  - Guide investment decisions toward a Paris-aligned 2050 future

#### **Underlying principles**

- Positive contribution: Focuses on defining substantial contributions to environmental objectives
- Avoiding negative contribution: Ensures no significant harm through the do no significant harm (DNSH) criteria
- Dynamic: Taxonomies are not static; they evolve in response to technological advancements, market developments, and evolving climate science, requiring regular updates to remain relevant and effective
- Good governance and transparency: Taxonomies serve the wider public, not just capital
  markets; they are designed to be inclusive and transparent in their design and development,
  and are supported by a robust governance structure to ensure effective implementation and
  market adoption
- Science-based: Taxonomies should be robust and credible
- Address transition: Accounts for the transition to green activities while ensuring a fair transition that considers all parts of society, leaving no one behind

#### Purpose of the NZ Taxonomy

- Enable market participants to mobilise and direct capital flows towards:
  - Building a low-emissions, Paris-aligned future
  - Restoring nature
  - Upholding the rights and interests of Indigenous Peoples of the land

#### **ITAG** recommendations

Report published July 2024, covering ten topics and 18 recommendations

#### Confirmation of Minister's direction for the NZ Taxonomy

- June 2024: ITAG recommendations shared with the Government
- June July 2024: Ministerial decisions made following officials' advice, with funding allocated to support the NZ Taxonomy development phase
- July 2024: 2+2 Ministerial meeting in Australia with announcement to progress NZ Taxonomy development, beginning with Agriculture and Forestry

Discussed considerations of being aligned with the 1.5-degree pathway and informed by science
